Te Hitori history

The first 'whānau class' was established in 1985 with the support of Eric Parker who was then the principal of Nelson Central School. He was approached by kaumātua and whānau of Te Kōhanga Reo ō Kōpuwai to establish a place for their children who would be entering the school. There was a need for these tamariki to retain their language and the values that the Kōhanga Reo had developed in their early years. Since then the 'whānau classes' have been known as Te Pouahi Syndicate.

Noho Marae

Each year the tamariki and Kaiako go to Whakatū Marae for the night, year 0/1s do not stay the night and can be collected in the afternoon after the day at the Marae. Mātua are encouraged to attend, and there will be some parent help needed. All parents staying overnight will need to be police vetted. (Forms are available from the office, and need to be completed at least 6 weeks previously).

If you have not previously attended a powhiri (been welcomed on to) Whakatū Marae you will need to attend the powhiri.

There is usually a Rūnanga Mātua at the Noho Marae also and we encourage all whānau to attend if possible. As above, if you have not been to the marae before you will also need to attend the powhiri on the first day.

Rūnanga Mātua

This is a hui for all Mātua (parents) to attend. Kaiako also attends and at times the Tumuaki (Principal) and a board representative will also attend. These are usually held on a Monday evening, once a term at the school. We start with shared kai ahead of the hui. Tamariki are welcome to come too and will usually play outside if it is light or watch a movie in the darker months. Co-Chairs are Natalie Gousmett and Api Filiai

Te Pou Pokapū

This is a private Facebook Group for all Te Pouahi whānau, a place to tautoko and awhi each other. It is a good place for questions, discussion, information sharing and organising meetups. Search on Facebook and ask to join if you are not a member, or ask Natalie Gousmett to add you.

Te Reo

Planning and implementation is delivered in both English and te reo Māori using Te Marautanga o Āotearoa and The New Zealand Curriculum. As per the guidelines of Māori Medium taumata 2, 50 – 81% of the learning day is instructed in te reo Māori.

It is an expectation that whānau will join their tamariki on their Te Reo and Tikanga Maori journey. NMIT, Te Wananga o Aotearoa and Te Ataarangi offer Te Reo classes in Nelson. There are also online classes and resources such as:
